



Fact Sheet 2020-21

Hartwick College is a private liberal arts and sciences college of 1,202 undergraduate students, located in Oneonta, NY, in the northern foothills of the Catskill Mountains. Hartwick's expansive curriculum emphasizes an experiential approach to the liberal arts. Through personalized teaching, collaborative research, a distinctive January Term, a wide range of internships, and many study-abroad opportunities, Hartwick ensures that students are prepared for not just their first jobs, but for the world ahead. A Three-Year Bachelor's Degree Program and strong financial aid and scholarship offerings keep a Hartwick education affordable. "Hartwick's goal is to enable our students to return for instruction while complying with the best guidance available to protect our community, both on- and off-campus," Hartwick College President Margaret L. Drugovich said. Coursework will be delivered both in-person and virtually for students in the fall semester. Changes to the academic calendar for the fall semester eliminated breaks until in-person instruction ends on Friday, November 20. All students will leave campus by November 21 and then complete the semester's instruction and exams remotely. Final exams conclude on December 10.

STUDENTS

Undergraduate: 1,185 full-time degree-seeking students come from 33 states and 13 countries; 58% female, 42% male; 22% ALANA (African-American, Hispanic, Asian-American, Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, and Native American); 2% international students; 76% New York State residents. Average class size is 15.12. Undergraduate FTE is 1190.7. 315 UG students studying remotely.

Graduate Program: translational biomedical research management (M.S.), inaugural year.

Three-year Degree Program: An accelerated program of study for 27 majors and allows the focused student to graduate in just three years. The program started in 2009. This year the College enrolled 107 (23 freshmen and 10 transfers) and they join 74 returning students.

Junior/Senior Major Enrollments: Social & Behavioral Sciences 94%; Humanities 20%; Physical and Life Sciences 84%; Business and Accounting 16%; Nursing & Medical Technology 22%; Interdisciplinary <1%. Largest enrollments are: Nursing, Business & Accounting, Biology, Public Health and Criminal Justice.

Student Organizations: More than 60 special interest student organizations are active on campus. Approximately 17% of students belong to Greek organizations, with four fraternities (three national and one international) and four sororities (one international, one national and two local).

Athletics: 421 (31%) (2019-20) of students participate in one or more sports (8 men's sports and 11 women's sports). Spring sport seasons interrupted by Covid. Affiliation: NCAA Division III sports include for women: basketball, cross-country, equestrian, field hockey, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track (indoor and outdoor), volleyball, and for men: basketball, cross-country, football, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, track (indoor and outdoor). Conference is Empire Eight.

ACADEMICS

Majors (35): undergraduate programs in accounting (general & CPA); actuarial math; anthropology; art; art history; biochemistry; biology; business administration; chemistry; computer science; creative writing; criminal justice; economics; English; environment, sustainability and society; environmental chemistry; French; geology and environmental sciences; global studies; history; mathematics; medical technology; music; music education; nursing; philosophy; physics; political science; psychology; public health; religious studies; sociology; Spanish; theatre arts. An Individual Student Program, a student-designed major, is offered for students whose interests lie outside an established major. Honors college – No Honors program – Yes.

Minors (44): cognitive science, criminal justice, documentary photography, environmental science and policy, finance, graphic communications, Latin American and Caribbean studies, literature or writing, museum studies, peace & conflict studies, U.S. ethnic studies, women's and gender studies. Minors also are available in almost all majors (31 of 45 majors).

Academic calendar: 4-1-4 (Fall, January, Spring)

Special Programs: certification in elementary and secondary education, dual certification in childhood/special education and middle childhood and adolescence/special education, honors. Certification in coaching.

Pre-Professional Programs: pre-allied health professions, pre-engineering, pre-law, pre-medicine.

Cooperative Programs: 4-1 MBA programs with Clarkson University or Union Graduate College; 3-3 J.D. program with Albany Law School; collaborative program for physical (DPT) and occupational therapy (MA) with Sage Graduate School. Cooperative Programs in Engineering with both Clarkson University and Columbia University. For undergraduate opportunities at Hartwick, there is the Partnership for Nursing Opportunities with Bassett Healthcare.

Graduate Program: translational biomedical research management (M.S.), inaugural year.

FACULTY

176 faculty members, of which 106 are full-time and 70 are part-time; 65% of full-time faculty members hold the highest degree in their disciplines; 76% of full-time faculty are tenured or on tenure-track, the student to faculty ratio is 9.58:1.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY & RESOURCES

The campus network provides cable TV access, wired and wireless Internet access. Hartwick's Stevens-German Library offers a collection of books, periodicals, microforms and films housed on our shelves and electronic resources accessible via the Internet. The Library's collection includes 209,405 books, 4,600 E-books, 59 digital databases, 3,300 media, 1,392 printed serials and 39,000 electronic serials.

RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES

Hartwick students other than commuters are required to live in College on-campus housing. Housing options include traditional residence halls, suites, apartments and townhouse apartments and the College's Pine Lake Environmental Campus, located eight miles from the main campus. Number of beds available on campus is 1,274.

GRADUATES & ALUMNI/AE

For the Class of 2019, 51% of the graduates are employed and 14% are enrolled in graduate or professional school.
